January 26 – 7:00pm: *History as a Hobby* - William Peak, M.A., American History, will discuss American history as his hobby. He will share some of the highlights of his journeys across America in search of our country's history. His historical collection will be on display during the presentation.

February 23 – 7:00pm – *What is going on in Education Today?* Dr. Malinda Daniel, author of *Fallacy or Truth; the State of American Education Today*, is a cross categorical teacher at Northview Elementary. She has a Ph.D. in educational leadership from Walden University, a master's degree from Northwest Missouri State University, and a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Missouri Western State University. She has certification in special education, reading, elementary education, and is working on her certification for educational leadership. She is married with two children, and lives on a small farm in McLouth.

March 23 – 7:00pm – *The History of Photography* presented by Lesia Winters.
